

# Sathya Sai School Plans for 2021 during COVID-19 Pandemic

#### 1. In-School and Online Learning

January 4 to 8, 2021: there will be online learning for everyone and the school building will be closed.

January 11 onwards: the school will return to the Hybrid model (students learning both online as well as in-class).

The Directors, the Principal and the staff looked at whether to reopen the school for the Hybrid model or go completely online effective January 18, 2021. Based on the Parent survey collected on Friday, December 8, 2020, should the school need to go to the complete Online model, almost 30% of the parent population said that one of the parents would have to let go their jobs. Therefore, the Directors and the school have decided to go ahead with the Hybrid model as of Monday, January 11, 2021 (same as September to December).

The school's Board of Directors will be guided by the Ministry of Education and Toronto Public Health policies and procedures for schools, to ensure that we meet all regulations, and in some cases even exceed them, to ensure the safety of the school community. Please be aware that changes in policy may be expected if there are substantial changes in Covid-19 cases in Toronto.

#### 3-Ply Masks

TPH has mandated 3-ply masks (with a polypropylene layer sandwiched between two layers of cotton fabric) as being more effective in preventing COVID transmission. The Directors are ardently looking at and making these 3-layered masks available for all staff and students as soon as the school reopens.

# Toronto Fire Officers Offer Virtual Workshops

Toronto Fire Service Officers Sherry Ballantyne and Mary Beck gave a virtual Fire Safety Workshop to students both in-school and online from JK to grade 3. This was followed with a virtual workshop by Officer Justin Law for students in grades 4 to 8.

Both workshops focused on safety measures to practice at home, such as: regular checking of smoke alarms, families drawing a Home Escape Plan, the importance of exiting from house or apartment as soon as possible if there is a fire and then calling 9-1-1 once you are safely outside, what to do if your clothes catch on fire, and how to keep smoke from entering through a door.

# 95<sup>th</sup> Birthday Celebration for Founder Chancellor Sri Sathya Sai Baba

Founder Chancellor Sri Sathya Sai Baba's 95<sup>th</sup> Birthday was celebrated at Sathya Sai School on Friday, November 20<sup>th</sup>. A special program is offered each year by students and teachers to appreciate and give gratitude for Sathya Sai Baba's life and work, and for the gift of our school. A special virtual program was prepared and presented by two grade 8 students, Ishwar Lowtan and Vanishri Sihota, under the guidance of their teacher Mrs. Nandini Menon. Their script follows:

"Good Morning ladies and gentlemen, boys and girls, from the Sathya Sai School gymnasium. Today is a very important day for all of us because it celebrates our Founder Chancellor's 95th Birthday November 23. Today marks 95 years of his blessings to the entire world, through various different projects. Today is also a very special day for us here at Sathya Sai School because it is the school's 20th anniversary. This signifies that Sai Baba's blessings are always showered on our school. Today's program consists an

introductory speech, a video on Sathya Sai Baba's projects, and his many contributions to the world, and finally a musical performance by the Grade 6 students.

"Sathya Sai Baba (born as Sathyanarayana Raju) was born in Puttaparthi, a small village in South India, on November 23, 1926. As a child he always demonstrated exemplary qualities of compassion, generosity and love, just to name a few, which distinguished him from the other children of his village.

"In October 1940, at the tender age of 14, he declared to his family and to the people of his village that he

would be known as Sathya Sai Baba, and that his mission was to bring about the spiritual regeneration of humanity, by demonstrating and teaching the highest principles of Truth, Right Conduct, Peace, Love and Nonviolence, as well as the principles of Educare. He said these Human Values are already in each child; the task is to draw them out.

"A few more important facts about Sathya Sai Baba – he has created a University with three campuses:

Anantapur women, Brindavan (near Bangalore) for men, and Prasanthi Nilayam, for men. He has developed two Super Specialty Hospitals, performing the latest heart operations, etc. and serving the poor. Sathya Sai Baba is also responsible for two major water projects, one serving over 700 villages in the state of Andhra Pradesh, and the other, bringing water to millions of people in the parched City of Chennai. All of these projects are entirely free. Students in his university and schools in India pay no tuition; the hospitals are entirely free too, yet, Sathya Sai Baba has

never solicited money from any one, and neither does the Sathya Sai International Organization."

This presentation was followed by a video showcasing Sathya Sai Baba's projects and his contribution to making the world a better place. It also showed highlights from the Sri Sathya Sai Institute of Higher Learning in India, as it puts into practice Sai Baba's philosophy of integral education known as Educare.

The program ended with a lively piece of music using only percussion rhythms, performed by Music teacher Mr. Labrada More and the grade 6 students.





Special thanks to Mr. Lojan, Mrs. Spaley, Mrs. Menon, Mr. More, Mr. Maharaj, Dr. Revathi, and all of the other students and volunteers who helped make this special program. Thank You also to everyone who tuned in and listened to this presentation. Live streaming for all the classes (both in-school and online) was provided by Mr. Arun Maharaj, IT Support and an alumnus.

Since distribution of food is not currently allowed due to COVID-19 safety regulations, the birthday cake this year was offered by all classes in the form of drawings of the birthday cake, which were compiled by grade 8 students together with a large birthday card. Each of the in-class grade 8 students also wrote a short tribute to Sai Baba on his 95<sup>th</sup> Birthday. These can be seen beneath the lovely floral altar of Sri Sathya Sai Baba, arranged by Mr. Lojan with help from Mrs. Spaley and aided by Menon Lojan of grade 6.






## SK Virtual Graduation, Nov. 20, 2020







#### Grade 4 - Ancient Egypt

As a part of Social Studies, students of grade 4 learnt about some of the world's earliest societies. They found out how early societies interacted with the environment and discovered what we today can gain from their ideas. One of the early civilizations that was inquired and investigated by students was Ancient Egypt. They not only researched and gathered facts but also created a Cartouche with their own names in Hieroglyphic script. In Egyptian hieroglyphs, a cartouche is an oval with a line at one end at right angles to the oval, indicating that the text enclosed is a royal name. In addition to this, with visual arts cross curricular integration students sketched and painted the Egyptian pharaohs, various gods and goddesses, exploring various pieces of ancient art.







#### Grade 5

#### Patterns in Mathematics: The Braille Alphabet

Students in grade 5 are learning the unit- Patterns in Mathematics. The Braille Alphabets were introduced as

a lesson in this unit in order to understand more real-life situations where patterns would be used. The braille alphabet has a fairly logical algorithm or "pattern" to its design. The first ten letters - a through j -- only involve

dots 1,2,4, and 5. The next 10 letters -- k through t -- are constructed by adding dot 3. The final five letters of the alphabet are formed by adding dot 6. While they were learning this, we took this opportunity to bring in language and SSEHV as a cross curricular connection. Students were given an article to read, on the story of Louis Braille. After the students were done reading, they were asked to answer the following questions:

#### How Fortunate are we?

Read the story about Louis Braille and answer the following questions:

- Blindfold yourself and try to write a sentence on a paper. See for yourself what you could write and how did you feel for those 5 mins. Close your eyes for 2 minutes and empathize with a blind person. After you put yourself in the blind person's shoes open your eyes and write how we all take our eyes for granted.
- What do you learn from Louis Braille's life who turned the six dots into a language even though he was visually challenged?
- How will you change your life knowing that we all are very fortunate to have what we have?
- After you have answered the questions try to write your first name, last name, favourite colour, favourite food, and any word of your choice using the braille alphabets.

Here are some student exemplars:

#### Abisha Amalan:

Blindfold yourself and try to write a sentence on a paper. See for yourself what you could write and how did you feel for those 5 mins. Close your eyes for 2 minutes and empathize with a blind person. After you put yourself in the blind person's shoes open your eyes and write how we all take our eyes for granted.

When I blindfolded myself and wrote I could not tell what I was writing, I felt frustrated and confused. I imagined to myself how much more patience and hard work they need to do the same work as us.

We are so lucky to be able to see, write and read very easily. We all think that everyone has the ability to see the world like we do. Sometimes we don't even think about our eyes at all but truly they are so important to us in many ways.

What do you learn from Louis Braille's life who turned the six dots into a language even though he was visually challenged?

Louis Braille was a role model to many visually challenged people. He has inspired me to achieve my goals and dreams no matter how hard it gets. Louis Braille had a goal to make a language for visually challenged people and he achieved it by working tirelessly every day in his free time.

How will you change your life knowing that we all are very fortunate to have what we have?

How fortunate are we? When I heard this story, I realized that sometimes it may not be fair to all those who have to do more, to achieve the same that we would be able to do way easier. I learnt to never take what I had for granted because if I do, I may lose it. I will appreciate how hard other people work. This is how fortunate I believe we are to have all these advantages.

#### Aira Shyam:

- The darkness of the blindfold made me feel helpless. I was trying my best to use all my other senses to help me understand my surroundings. However, when my parents called me, I could not walk over to them. It was very challenging. I understood that I was fortunate to have my vision. I think we all take our eyes for granted because we tend not to notice that we are lucky to have them. For instance, we can all read and write easily, but blind people have to learn a separate complicated language because they have to feel the letters to comprehend. In addition, it is not easy to express their ideas on paper.
- After reading this passage I realized that you should always take initiative to solve problems even if you are challenged or there are barriers. Louis Braille was physically challenged but he came up with a solution to help all blind people.
- I will keep in mind that physical challenges are not barriers. There are always solutions to help others.
   In addition, it's important not to take our abilities for granted.

#### Ishani Punithavel:

When I closed my eyes for 2 minutes, I tried playing piano and it turned out sounding awful. It tortured my ears because when I tried to put the volume down, I accidentally put the volume up. My ears are still ringing from this experience. Just imagine doing everyday stuff and for example cooking, you could burn your hand or cut it up. When I wrote with my eyes closed for five minutes, my work looked sloppy. I understood why Louis Braille would want to make a reading and writing system for blind people. He wanted to make their lives and the teachers' lives easier.

What I learned from Louis Braille, is if you have a big problem you can work hard and solve it. For instance, Louis Braille chose to write a language for blind people to read and write even though he was blind with one eye. But he worked hard and he finally created a language for blind people to go to school and be able to keep up with the rest of their classmates. This shows if you work hard enough you can do anything.

How will you change your life knowing that we all are very fortunate to have what we have?

With these activities I learned that we take our eyes for granted, we should have gratitude for being able to see, and do things some kids cannot.

#### **Dhruv Patel:**

A2) I learnt from Louis Braille that even in the worst chances of loss, there is still success and hope. He is an exemplary person...and will always be.

A3) It will change my life because now I am grateful that I have eyes and I can see and not undertake the challenges of being blind.

We humans (with insight) disregard the pain and misery that blind people suffer because we haven't experienced the same events. For example: Blind people have suffered troubles in reading and writing, even for braille, because it takes time to make a blind person learn braille. But humans with eyesight suffer things that blind people don't, such as blurry and watery eyes, when staring at a screen or reading too much.

2. What do you learn from Louis Braille's life who turned the six dots into a language even though he was visually challenged?


Louis Braille was determined to make a language for blind people, as he himself was blind and couldn't do normal things such as playing sports where you need hand-eye coordination. I learned that we should have determination, faithfulness, intelligence, and willpower.

3. How will you change your life knowing that we all are very fortunate to have what we have?

Whenever I feel discouraged, I'll remember how blind people are not even able to do some simple things.

#### **Anisha Gupta:**

- 1. When I closed my eyes, I felt weird and different. Blind people must be used to it. We take our eyes for granted and don't take care of them. For example, we look closely at an electronic device for hours, which is harmful to our eyes. When I blindfolded my eyes, I could not write much and it was pretty messy. In those five minutes, I finally learned how much they struggle to do simple things we can.
- 2. Louis Braille never gave up because he wanted to help people who are visually impaired to feel all experiences people with eyesight can.
- 3. I will take care of my eyes and not take them for granted and not ruin them.



## Preparations for Reopening the School Sept 2020

In August 2020, Ontario's government officials declared that schools should reopen for full-time in-school learning. Parents would have the option to send their children to school or keep them home for online learning.

Guided by the Directors and sub-committees of the Sathya Sai School of Toronto-Canada, employees and volunteers worked long hours to prepare the school to meet government guidelines for safety measures.

## Sept 8 Sathya Sai School Reopens


On September 8<sup>th</sup>, Sathya Sai School of Toronto-Canada opened its doors, with full safety measures in place, PPEs distributed to students and staff, and physical distancing enforced. Teachers are providing Synchronous Learning: teaching students in-class and simultaneously online to students at home. The figures are 43% in-school and 57% online. While most school boards hired additional teachers to handle the online students, Sathya Sai School's dedicated and talented teachers are meeting the challenge of teaching both inschool and online students.

With the cooperation of all parents filling out Daily Health Check forms and keeping students at home who show any signs of cold or flu, the Sathya Sai School community has so far been successful in protecting the health of its students and staff.





















## **Toronto Public Health Nurse Inspection**

Toronto Public Health has been undertaking onsite visits of both public and private schools, to ensure that they are following safety mitigation measures for COVID-19. On December 10, 2020, our school was inspected by Ms. Luxshana Premachandran, RN, Public Health Nurse, following a detailed assessment checklist. She gave a positive report about Sathya Sai School's preparedness for COVID-19. Here are some of the safety measures our school has taken to meet TPH requirements:

- 5 entrance/exit points designated by groups of grade levels. Screening poster on each door. Sanitization table provided for compulsory hand hygiene before entering school premise.
- All signage re: COVID-19 healthy behaviours including handwashing, protective measures and mask wearing posted visibly on hallways, doors, and in classrooms near sinks and frequently touched surfaces.
- Main entrance screening station for visitors assessed. Hand sanitizer available. Paper screening form to be filled and handed to main office upon arrival. QR code available for electronic screening form – contactless delivery.
- Visual markers/cues spaced 2 metres apart in hallways visible and clear.
- All classrooms have students seated in designated table and chair, physically 1-2 m distanced and facing forward
- Water fountains have been sealed off as a cue to avoid direct contact.
- Visual markers for one-way routes implemented throughout school.
- An isolation room allocated at the main entrance of school across man office.
- Cleaning and disinfection protocols have been discussed. Frequent touch points and general cleaning and disinfection are being completed by Head Custodian using Lysol wipes. Fogging machine has been ordered. Night Caretaker staff perform cleaning and disinfection of facility using bleach (concentration 1:50)
- Staff wear double ply cotton masks (consisting of two layers of spun bonded thermal polypropylene

- microfibers) and face shields. Medical masks are in stock in each classroom to use in case of any contact with a symptomatic individual.
- PHN, Principal and Board of Directors discussed about mask-wearing factors including comfort, safety and protection. Confirmed that triple ply masks have been arranged for staff members to use. (Note: triple ply masks will be available for students in January 2021.)
- All students from K-Grade 8 have been provided with five doubly ply cloth masks each that are worn on rotation. 100% compliance from students.
- Mask breaks are provided during recess and/or snack breaks. Students maintain physical distancing while masks are taken off for eating.
- Masks are instructed to be washed each day. Ample supply provided to students via school efforts to ensure students are wearing clean and dry masks to school each day.
- Visual cues on floors and signage on posters visible to remind staff and students about physical distancing.
- Staggered periods for students to use washroom.
   Lunch and snack breaks are provided in designated classroom. No crowds in hallways witnessed at time of visit.
- Students demonstrated waving and personal greeting (while social distancing) to greet PHN during visit.
- Each student has their own cubby and box to keep personal items in. Disinfected and cleaned by caretaker staff.
- Age appropriate kid friendly posters and signage available to inform students of COVID-19 healthy behaviours including hand washing and respiratory etiquette.
- Virtual staff training provided regularly.


Ms. Premachandran was also extremely happy about our spacious Isolation Room and our stock of PPE required to tide us through these unprecedented times.


