





Commander Paul A. Smith Pays a Visit



It was early October when the school received an e-mail from the Department of National Defense (DND) in Ottawa. They asked if the school would be interested in applying to have a speaker come to the school as part of the Veteran's Speakers Week series in honour of Remembrance Day. There were a number of options to choose from including having someone come in person or having a virtual speaker. After speaking to Dr. Revathi it was decided we'd apply to have someone come to the school in person since it had been two years since anyone could come to the school due to Covid restrictions.

The form was filled out and submitted and then the wait began. We waited and waited but we didn't hear any news so an inquiry was made as to the status of our application. We were told a decision had yet to be made and we would have to wait a little longer. In the meantime, the DND sent an educational package that contained colouring sheets and stories for the younger students and more in-depth stories and research suggestions for older students. The DND also sent several YouTube links to various songs which are played during Remembrance Day ceremonies. One of the songs they sent was O Canada, performed by members of various Canadian Armed Forces Bands across Canada. (You can view the video by clicking <u>HERE</u>.)

We were down to the final hours when we were notified that we would have an in-person speaker. Then on the morning of November 7 a tall, slim, impeccably dressed man in a Navy uniform showed up at the front door of the school. His name was Commander Paul Smith. He was the Commanding Officer of His Majesty's Canadian Ship York.

Commander Smith was born in Jamaica and moved to Canada when he was 6 years old. He joined the Naval Reserve while he was in high school and began his full-time service after university. In 2014, Commander Smith took

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command of His Majesty's Canadian Ship Kingston and became the first black officer to command a ship in the Royal Canadian Navy. He now commands the largest Naval Reserve division in Canada.

As he waited patiently for the morning assembly to begin, he asked if there were any specific topics, we would like him to speak about to the students. The topic that was suggested was about wearing a uniform. Commander Smith gladly agreed. After being introduced on stage by Dr. Revathi he spoke to the students about the importance of wearing a uniform and how he felt honoured and privileged to wear his Canadian Navy uniform. He told the students he felt very proud to wear his uniform especially when he was in another country. He went on to say that the students should feel proud to wear their uniform and ensure that it is worn properly as they are representing their school.

Commander Smith also talked about his career and that he had started his career at the bottom ranks of cleaning ships but with hard work and determination he had worked his way up to Commander and he was very proud to be the first black man in the Canadian Navy to achieve that level.

He spoke to the students about his career and told them he had traveled the world. He had worked in Europe and in the Arctic. He asked the students, by show of hands how many of you have ever visited the Arctic? It was a surprise the number of the younger student's whose hands shot up to say they had been to the Arctic. A smile came to his face, as he encouraged those that had yet to visit the area to do so if given the opportunity, that it would be worth the visit. Another area he had been deployed during his career was the Caribbean. He explained that although one might wonder how the navy would be protecting Canada while on a ship in the Caribbean, he explained that they stopped boats carrying drugs that were often headed towards Canada.

Commander Smith finished his talk by telling the students about one group of veterans that have often been forgotten. They are the men of the No. 2 Black Battalion. He wanted students to remember those men. Commander Smith explained that many Asian and Black men were told that they could not enlist but that did not deter them because they were determined to help and therefore formed the No. 2 Black Battalion. He explained the important role these men played and asked the students to remember them. (To read more about the No. 2 Black Battalion click <u>HERE</u>.)

Now some speakers may have finished their first talk and been on their way but not Commander Smith. He agreed to stay through the skit the grade 4 class was performing that day and to give his speech again to the old students during the second assembly.

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At the end of the two assemblies, he gladly took photos with all the classes and staff. When he heard there were former students there that day that had come to volunteer, he asked to speak to them. They along with the grade 8 students joined him in the gym to talk about what they had planned for their futures. When they told him of their areas of interest such as medicine and engineering, he explained to them how they could take those interests and have a very fulfilling and rewarding career while serving the country in the navy, army, or air force. He strongly encouraged them to explore the possibility.

Before Commander Smith left that day the students presented him with a lightbox that they had made. He was very touched by the gift and said he would use it when he got home. It was a few days later when we received this message from him.

Good evening,

I just wanted to say thank you for the gift. We had friends over this evening, and they commented on the lantern. It led me to talk about your students and your wonderful school. Thanks again!

Commander Smith's visit had a profound effect on all of us at the school that day. A few of the students were so moved by him that they came up with the idea of having each class create a card for the veterans.

On the following page, you can see just a few of the cards that the students created. On Thursday, November 10 the cards were dropped off at Canadian Legion Branch 617 on Warden Avenue just north of Eglinton where they were warmly received and displayed for the veterans on Remembrance Day.

Commander Smith was very impressed with Mrs. Vora's Grade 4 class who put on two performances of their skit during the assembly.


JK students dressed in their white top and blue tutus dance to *Mother Earth*.

A Proud Sathya Sai School Alumni - Geertika Jeyaganesha



Geertika Jeyaganesha is a proud Sathya Sai School Alumni (Class of 2019), who graduated as Valedictorian. She is now in her final year of highschool, eager to achieve her professional goals while fostering the values she learnt. Geertika founded Nurtured Youth Community in August 2022 with an ignition to fight for social change. Nurtured Youth Community is an organization that bridges the gap between minors experiencing unsupportive relationships with parents/guardians and helpful resources to assist in supporting their situation.

Fuelled with an urge to help thousands in similar situations to her friend, Geertika began messaging industry professionals such as MD candidates, emotional coaches and therapists on Linkedin. Geertika's mission is to connect minors to experts through free, accessible ZOOM meetings all over Canada because she believes nobody's mental health should be left up to the question of their circumstance. Through relentless pursuit, persuasion

persistence, Geertika was able to secure a roster of professionals who joined her mission. She has successfully held numerous sessions with attendees all over Canada.

The SSEHV class in Sathya Sai School was the building block to Geertika's journey to service. It left a lasting impact on her, acknowledging that one's privilege should be used to help others and make an impact on the world. Geertika is grateful for the support provided by the Sathya Sai School community during her time there, as well as the core morals it has ingrained in her. During her service journey she constantly recalls Baba's quote, "Start small, grow big" to stay determined. She says Sathya Sai School has opened her heart to an empathic approach. The values are something she



always resorts to when making decisions, and serving others. Geertika believes this mentality is an important part of the development of all youth.

In October of 2022, her organization won the Grand OXY prize out of the top six changemaking organizations in Canada through a worldwide voting process. She has had five interviews with CBC and spoke on the "Be the Change" Podcast about how change ultimately requires effort. In February 2023, she had an interview for National Television at Sathya Sai School to come back to her roots and give thanks to where it all began.
